

Student Injury Procedure

Do you know what procedure to follow for a student injury emergency? Here's a brief summary of some important information:

If the person is an MCC student:

If injury occurs on campus

- * Seek help by calling the MCC Public Safety office at 480-461-7777 at the Southern and Dobson campus or 480-465-7444 at the Red Mountain campus. They can help arrange transport by ambulance to a medical facility. They will file a report about the accident and obtain necessary insurance information from the student. Do NOT transport the student yourself unless absolutely necessary.
 - * If injury occurs off campus while on a school sponsored event arrange for transport to medical facility instead of driving student yourself, unless necessary.
- * The student should be advised to fill out a Maricopa County Community College District Student Accident Insurance Claim Form if possible and have it signed by a college official so they can take it to the medical facility. The form is available in the Dean of Student's Office at Southern and Dobson or the Student Life Office at Red Mountain, or Public Safety can advise completion of the form. The form has multiple copies and the student will receive a copy for his or her records. (If injury occurs off campus a form may not be available until return to campus.)
 - * If the student is concerned that he or she has no medical coverage and cannot pay, here is some pertinent information:
- 1. Any facility that works with federal funding (most do) cannot refuse treatment, even if the student is unable to pay at time of treatment.
- 2. The medical facility will use the student's primary insurance first, and if the student is not covered under any other insurance policy, accident or health insurance plan, then the student is covered by the Maricopa Community Colleges Student Accident Insurance Plan. Any person registered as a day or evening division student who is enrolled in an approved credit and/or noncredit class is covered by the plan for free.
 - * Students who do not have any injury and sickness insurance are urged to enroll in a voluntary plan and the student is responsible for this premium.
 - 3. The plan covers accidents while the student is:
 - * Attending classes during the hours when college is in session.
 - * Traveling for regular class sessions, directly to or from home and college other than by motorized vehicle, but not longer than one hour before class commences or one hour after class is dismissed or for the time required when traveling in an authorized and furnished school vehicle.

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- * No coverage is provided for any motorized vehicle not supervised and provided by the District.
- * Participating in or attending an activity exclusively sponsored, calendared and supervised by the college; and traveling to and from the activity in an authorized vehicle.
- * Coverage is also provided for children of properly registered students using officially designated childcare facility on or off campus.
- * If the student is using the Student Accident Insurance Plan, they will receive increased benefit amounts if PPO providers are utilized. Go to www.myfirsthealth.com or call 1-800-226-5116 for information on PPO providers.
- * The student will be responsible for payment at time of treatment, and if their claim is accepted by our in surance carrier they will be reimbursed after they submit the claim form. Our insurance will pay covered expenses if incurred one year after the date of the accident.
- * The student, NOT MCC, must submit the claim form. Bills must be submitted within 120 days of the accident. The maximum benefit payable is \$25,000.

Special considerations for students injured on a school-sponsored trip:

- * MCC official should take travel packet with claim forms in case of accidents.
- * Even if you are not on campus, call and make a report with MCC Public Safety Office, available 24/7.
- * Arrange for transport to medical facility instead of driving student yourself, unless necessary.
- * Don't fill out the claim form for the student. They should do it if at all possible because of privacy policy considerations.

Special considerations for students who are employees or official volunteers with signed paperwork:

- * If they are "on the clock" and the injury is work related, they must report injury to supervisor and fill out "Supervisor's Report of Industrial Injury" and take to medical facility.
- * An employee who chooses to seek medical attention must go to an authorized industrial medical center for initial medical attention. List of locations are available from MCC Human Resources Dept.

Special considerations for students under 18 who are visiting the college or participating in a summer activity:

* Parents or chaperones will take over, but a report should still be filed with MCC's Public Safety office.

If the student feels that MCC has been negligent, he or she may file a Notice of Claim with the Office of General Counsel. This must be filed within 180 days after the accident. If they are denied payment, they may then file a lawsuit.

the past 10 years to remind the public to be safe around water.

This year marks the tenth anniversary for Water Safety Day, an event that began as a tragedy when Weston Letter, age 3, drowned in his family's pool. Weston's mother Druann Letter and grandmother, MCC Dean, Carol Achs turned their grief into action when they established a water safety and drowning prevention program in memory of Weston.

"Ten years ago, I asked Dr. Christiansen (MCC president at that time) if MCC would support a

water safety event at MCC," Carol said. "His yes has lead to nearly 16,000 children being educated about water safety."

The event first sponsored by MCC, local fire departments, Valley Toyota dealers, SRP and La-Z-Boy Furniture Galleries has grown in the Valley's official kickoff to swimming season referred to as, Water Watchers at Phoenix Children's Hospital.

"When you look at the ten-year perspective, you can see that we have reduced drowning in our community and this program has been a significant factor in that reduction," Tiffaney Isaacson, Phoenix Children's Hospital water safety coordinator said.

In conjunction with this year's Water Safety Day, pool fences have been made available by Carol Achs and will be distributed to the first five MCC students to apply, meet the guidelines and are accepted by the Adopt-A-Pool Fence program. Applications can be found at http://www.saverkids.org/ . Once inside the application, in the box "How did you hear about this program," please indicate MCC student.

"Drowning is preventable," Carol said. "Always watch your children around water, fence your pool and learn CPR."

The MCC Southern and Dobson campus will host 1,200 first graders from the East Valley and Phoenix at this year's event March 24.

"I am always overwhelmed by the support and enthusiasm for the event," Carol said.
