

Harkins and Fuddruckers to Make Way for New Arts Complex

A new Performing and Fine Arts complex is slated for the southeast corner of MCC's Southern and Dobson campus, currently the location of the Harkins Theatre and Fuddruckers restaurant. The Maricopa County Community College District Governing Board recently approved the purchase of the 4.99 acre site and buildings. The complex will accommodate art, dance, music and theater programs as outlined in the 2004 bond package.

"My thanks to the leadership of the college for pursuing this innovative method of accomplishing the project outlined in the bond package in the face of diminishing bond funds due to inflation in the construction industry," wrote Bernie Ronan, MCC's acting president, in a campus email.

Approximately \$4 million in bond funds would be used to purchase the site and buildings, with additional bond funds earmarked to remodel the space. The restaurant is approximately 7,000 square feet and the theatre is approximately 21,000 square

feet. The acquisition would enable the college to move construction of the Performing and Fine Arts complex from fiscal year 2010 to 2008.

The next steps will include an inspection of

the property and final review and approval by MCCCD's Facilities Planning and Development.

Two pivotal projects are underway for future successful alumni outreach initiatives:

* Creation of a directory of all MCC alumni – MCC has contracted with Harris Connect to produce the 2008 Alumni Directory. The directory may only be purchased by MCC alumni and is available in hard- or soft-bound editions or CD-Rom. Alumni information will be listed four ways: biographically, by class year, geographically, and by career code.

The directory is a win for alumni as well as the college. Alumni benefit from a valuable resource for professional networking, finding old friends, and connecting with alumni in the region where they currently live. Through an intensive information

gathering process to compile the directory, the college receives richer data about our alumni than it has ever had before, including email addresses, phone numbers, professions, and college activities and initiatives of interest to alumni.

* Online community — The online community will allow the college to communicate frequently with alumni based on their interests. In addition to updating their contact information, alumni will be able to view and register for events, add their names to volunteer lists, donate online, search for and communicate with other alumni, and post class notes.

Ongoing activities

* The Alumni and Friends newsletter is published 2-3 times each year. The Alumni Office updates mailing addresses based on the returned mail.

- * Events to interest and involve alumni in the life of the college are offered throughout the school year. Events are designed to appeal to various demographics that comprise our alumni base and range from reunions and faculty-guided tours to social activities that provide a service or benefit to alumni members.
- * Student scholarships are awarded by the MCCAA each year based on available funds. Fundraising includes a silent auction at the annual Homecoming celebration and direct mail campaigns in collaboration with the MCC Development Office
- "Alumni engagement ultimately benefits the college by providing a pool of strong advocates for MCC who serve as a resource for current students and the college community at large," Marcy said.

MCC Homecoming festivities kick off with 2nd Annual Sports Hall of Fame Ceremony

On Nov. 2, Mesa Community College will honor the administrators, community leaders, coaches and athletes who are part of MCC's athletic tradition at the 2nd Annual Sports Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. The event at Dobson Ranch Inn inducts 10 individuals and kicks off a weekend of homecoming festivities.

"I think it's one of the class events we have at MCC," said MCC head football coach Dan Dunn. "Emotionally it's very moving to have successful athletes who have been part of world events contribute their success to their experience at MCC."

Sports information director Todd Bolser said choosing this year's list of inductees was not an easy task.

"MCC has so many great athletes, we had a hard time making the list," Bolser said. "We had to whittle down the prospective inductees."

The list honors inductees from 1965 through 1980. Heading the list is former team physician Elmer Heap, who will be recognized for his community service for tending to athletes' injuries free of charge in the '70s. Basketball coach Ed Van Winkle and baseball coach Jim Frye will receive the Outstanding Coaches Award.

Athletes selected include: Oscar Ramirez (football), Mickey Hatcher (football/baseball), Vernon Wilkins (baseball), Chris Laursen (football), Kari Pew White (volleyball, track and field), George Hall (basketball), and Mark Murro (track and field).

Organizers say the annual ceremony encourages attendees to lend support toward expanding MCC's community-based athletic program.

"We are looking to build upon the already established momentum generated from last year's successful ceremony," Bolser said.

On Saturday, the public is invited to meet MCC's Hall of Fame inductees, past and present, and enjoy the homecoming activities that begin at noon. Free food, entertainment, games and various booths will be offered, followed by the game against the Glendale Gauchos at 2 p.m.

John Mulhern, MCC's acting athletic director, said the Hall of Fame ceremony and homecoming festivities benefit both the college and the community.

"When you honor the past, you create your future," Mulhern said.

Artist creates bowls for charity event

Hopi artist Stephanie Lomatewama's artwork is rich with symbolism that reflects her life experiences on the Hopi reservation. As she crafts bowls for the upcoming Empty

Bowls charity events at both Mesa Community College campuses, Stephanie uses a variety of colors to paint corn stalks on four different sides of the bowls.

"I use blue, yellow, red and white corn stalks because these are the four main corns we use for food and prayer," said Lomatewama, an MCC student. "Underneath the stalk I put a brown image that represents the land we live on and live off of."

Lomatewama incorporates a cloud or rain design into her bowl to represent Hopi rain-prayer ceremonies and paints an image all the way around the bowl as a symbol of moisture and continuity. "The moisture symbol is continuous, with no breaks, to symbolize that there are no breaks in life—everything is connected," she said.

Lomatewama, who leaves the reservation during the school year to attend MCC, remains very connected to her culture and family. Her father, Ramson Lomatewama, is a well-established artist who makes his living as a glass blower in the town of Hotevilla on the Hopi reservation, about 100 miles northeast of Flagstaff. Her mother, brother and three sisters all create art symbolic of the Hopi culture.

Lomatewama said her art helps her through hard times and allows her to

come to terms with the changes occuring in her culture.

"My art is really inspired by my whole experience of trying to balance two worlds at the same time," she said.

Lomatewama is one of many artists who have donated artwork for two Empty Bowls events. For the purchase of a \$10 handcrafted bowl, art enthusiasts are invited to stay and dine on a simple meal of bread and soup in remembrance of World Hunger Day. Proceeds go to Paz de Cristo, a non-profit interfaith outreach organization that serves the needy and homeless in the East Valley.

In addition to thousands of handcrafted bowls, shoppers can also bid in a silent auction on art pieces crafted by local artists and various gift items from local merchants.
