The team has implemented a cutting edge technology called server "virtualization," using a product called VMware. This leadership prompted the District to site license VMware, thus saving MCC hundreds of thousands of dollars in future hardware and software costs. This team has also engaged Internet giant GOOGLE and is currently in the final stages to bring a whole new email/calendar/chat infrastructure to our student population, again, saving hundreds of thousands of dollars in future capital expenses.

This team was also primarily responsible for the IT DataCenter redesign and rebuild, as well as the district-wide upgrade to the VAX replacement system, called CHARON VAX, a project led by Jonathan Trottier and installed at all Maricopa colleges.

Members of this team are constantly reinventing themselves as technology changes and every day their work benefits the academic community. From MYMCC to WEBCT, to the current and future SIS systems, this team works very hard to make sure our students and faculty have access to cutting-edge resources.










The colorful display of 54 flags representing some of the countries from which MCC's international populations hails served as the backdrop for a strategic conversation on MCC's global and international initiatives.
