MCC Hosts Forum on "The Future of Voting"

Through the collaboration of the Maricopa Community Colleges and KPHO/Channel 5, a special forum was held on Jan. 29 at Mesa Community College on "The Future of Voting." Led by KPHO's **Cary Pfeffer**, a panel of elected officials and political consultants discussed this important issue with faculty and


students of Mesa Community College and community members. Guest panelists were:

- Betsey Bayless, Arizona Sec. of State,

Prompting this discussion was Florida's recent presidential election turmoil, which focused on voting irregularities and dimpled chads. Is Arizona's situation similar to Florida's? What will the voting process look like in the 21st century? Are we ready for Internet voting?

Sec. of State **Betsey Bayless** pointed listeners to her Web site, www.sosaz.com, which describes an Internet voting demonstration project conducted at a Phoenix precinct last November to explore the possibility of

voting online. While panelists seemed to agree that online voting will someday become a reality, they also seemed to share the belief that we're just not ready yet.



Until we are ready for online voting, the state must deal with the

system already in place. Ms. Bayless said that five of the state's

In addition to punch-card systems and online voting, audience members raised several other topics, such as campaign financing, impacts of early voting, "electronic terrorism," wooing disenfranchised voters, and enticing young people and minorities to exercise their right to vote. Following the issues forum, columnist and editorial writer **Robert Robb**, from The Arizona Republic, made a presentation on the Electoral College.

Sen. Cummiskey noted that it would take \$3.5 million to bring Arizona's 10

MCC's Advisement/Transfer Center Responds to Students

Judy Taussig just keeps smiling as she walks amidst the rubble and dust of the Advisement Center's remodeling project. As Director of Instructional Support Services and Student

Development, Judy is well aware that the renovation resolves at least two major enrollment issues: (1) the critical need to provide space for additional advisors and (2) streamlining the student enrollment process by locating the Advisement and Transfer centers under one roof.

Statistics point to the wisdom of a co-location for Advisement and Transfer. In January 2001, Judy said, the Advisement Center serviced 3,619 students, and 79 percent indicated that eventually they plan to transfer to universities. After the renovation, students will be able to complete both advisement and transfer activities without ever leaving the building.

And that's not all. Also shown on the renovation plans are two registration phones, a computer sign-in station to see an advisor, 24 computers that provide student access to the Course Applicability System (see article on CAS), and a cashier station for paying fees and tuition. The new design includes two offices for university representatives who regularly visit MCC to assist with transfers.

One space will be missing from the newly renovated center: a waiting room. Students will sign in on computer to see an advisor, be issued a pager, and then retire to the adjacent outdoor covered patio or the lobby of the Kirk Center until the pager beckons their return. After consulting an advisor about their programs of study and any transfer issues, students may register online at the computers provided for this purpose, or they can register for classes on either of two telephones that connect directly to the Call Center. From the

Advisement/Transfer Center's computers, students can apply to any university in the United States, get help with advisement, register for classes, pay tuition, or access CAS. "One-stop service is a model across the country," Judy said. Combining the Advisement and Transfer functions and providing better computer capabilities for students is not only a move

> toward this nationwide trend, but also a direct response to students' requests for improving the MCC advisement process.

MCC's new Advisement/Transfer Center will be finished in early April. The college's own highly skilled carpenters and contractors in Maintenance and Operations will complete the construction work, and Walsh Office Supply will provide the furnishings.

CAS, a Powerful Tool for Students

The Course Applicability System, also called CAS, is a Web-based application that provides Arizona students with the following:

- A guide showing university equivalent courses for community college course work
 - A guide showing how community college course work applies to university degree programs

The objective is to provide transfer planning tools so students can be successful in their objectives at community college, while planning for transfer to a university at some time in the future. The customized guides are based on each student's course work, including completed courses, courses in progress, and courses planned for future semesters.

Using CAS, a student can develop a course work portfolio that may include courses from any of the Arizona public community colleges. The student can then see how the portfolio meets the requirements for various degree programs at the universities. In addition, students can

determine their progress in completing the Arizona General Education Curriculum at Central Arizona College or Pima Community College.


Talk About Fun!
