These employee leaders have stepped to the plate to represent their coworkers—on MCC's campuses and at the District level. Each represents a different employee group at MCC, and the policies and procedures for the groups can differ dramatically.

But many of the leaders' duties are similar. They schedule meetings and deal with campus issues, policy development and grievance procedures. They serve as sounding boards and advisors. Basically, they're the ones who get a call when there's a problem. As Jim said, "I'm the first point of contact."

Johnice Wilkins is the Director of Student Leadership and President of MAT (Management, Administrative and Technological employees). She has worked at MCC for 24 years. Johnice previously served as both secretary and vice president of MAT.

Anita Dusek is the Administrative Secretary of Exercise Science and is serving her first term as President of PSA (Professional Staff Association). The Association includes support staff, secretaries, administrative assistants, lab technicians and technology people—174 employees in all.

Jim Dusek is MCC's Building Maintenance Technician and the Representative for M&O (Maintenance & Operations) and Crafts. M&O includes grounds and custodial employees, maintenance assistants, and the building maintenance tech. Crafts includes carpenters, electricians, plumbers, painters and HVAC (heating and air conditioning) employees. Jim is in his second year as the representative for this employee group.

Staying in touch with all of the employees at multiple sites is an ongoing challenge for MCC's leaders.

"Good communication can be difficult," Anita said, "especially with a second comprehensive campus. I visit the various sites, and I plan to have a PSA meeting at Red Mountain in March. We post minutes of meetings and a calendar on our Web site."

"There *has* to be good communication," Johnice asserted. "I took a tour of our new campus and stopped to talk with the employees. Maybe we'll hold meetings at Red Mountain. We

ArtWork Offers Lessons in Chalk

Probably the most thought-provoking and certainly the largest entry in this year's Art Faculty Show was a drawing in chalk at the bottom of the steps leading to the Kirk Center. It's a scale drawing depicting the twin towers of the World Trade Center before their collapse on Sept. 11. Art faculty member **Cyndi Greening** and

friend **Joan Waters** collaborated to create a visual interpretation of the events of this fateful day and devised a way to share the experience with others. The artists offer these comments:

After the tragedy on Sept. 11, like many of us, we felt we wanted to do something. As artists, we envisioned uniting other artists all around the country in a positive counter-

action that would help people understand the magnitude of what has happened from a different perspective. We've come up with "Drawn Together - A Nationwide Artist Anti-Terrorist Action."

Using sidewalk chalk, a tape measure, and the downloadable plans on our Web site, http://www.drawntogether.org, we invite artists and all interested individuals around the country to create these scale drawings in their communities. The drawing shows the World Trade Center towers and two 767 airplanes drawn to scale next to humans (the

towers are 32 feet tall next to people that are 1.5 inches high). Special writings surround the buildings and provide additional food for thought.

We've done several of these drawings in the Phoenix /Mesa/Tempe area (see Web site for photos), and they have been received extremely positively. When people stand next to the huge outlines of the buildings and the small people, they are able to understand what happened in a very different way than words, photos and language can convey. By creating these drawings in parks and schools around the nation, artists are able to bring a unique and new perspective to the tragedy.

Please help us spread the word. Visit the Web site, share it with friends, and go out and do one (or several) of these drawings in your community. We think we can make an impact with this project.

Banner Health Partners with MCC

Twenty-eight employees from Desert Samaritan Medical Center have been named to a pilot program funded by Banner Health of Arizona to address the shortage of qualified workers in the health care field.

Banner Foundation of Arizona provided funding to launch the Essential Career Pathways Pilot Project (ECP). The project is set up as a "grow your own" plan, offering current Desert Samaritan employees who hold entry level jobs a way to enter college. These employees now have the opportunity to earn their Associate degree as registered nurses. Banner Foundation is covering the costs of tuition, books, study guides, fees and nursing exams.

In return, the students made a commitment to stay with Banner as full-time employees for three years upon completion of their educational pathway program.

Mesa Community College, in partnership with Banner Health, tested the candidates for placement and advised, welcomed and registered them for the fall semester. Currently they are working toward completing their prerequisites before they can make application to the nursing program.

Essential Career Pathways was built by Banner as a result of a study released in Oct. 2000, which shows that there is a 16 percent vacancy rate for registered nurses in Arizona, compared to the 11 percent average rate nationwide.

Myrna Eshelman, chair of MCC's school of nursing, said, "Because the vacancy rates in Arizona are higher than the national average, there is a huge push by the Arizona Health Care and Hospital Association to recruit and retain nurses."

Perhaps Jim faces the greatest communication hurdles because M&O and Crafts employees work different shifts. President Christiansen meets with us every year," Jim said. "We come in early, the late shift stays late, and the President accommodates us." The custodians work from 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.; the grounds crew and Crafts employees arrive at 5 in the morning and leave by mid afternoon. For special meetings, timing is critical.

All three group leaders attribute their successes to others who help them get the job done. "I have been fortunate to work with good people," Johnice said. Anita expressed appreciation for her coworkers as well: "I thank all of the PSA members for their support," she said, "and Dr. Christiansen has been a wonderful advocate for us." Jim also noted that he is not alone in representing M&O and Crafts employees. He mentioned John Adler, a representative for the custodial crew; Ray Fowler, representative for the M&O day shift; and Crafts representative Tim Sterk.

In addition to the commitment they have made to their respective employee groups, the leaders also get together on a regular basis to compare notes. None of them, however, seems to be burdened by the extra hours required to hold the volunteer posts. "It's nice to be representing all the voices here," Johnice said.




Participants are encouraged to arrive at 12 noon and stay till 1:30 p.m. to receive the full benefit of the event.
